Seneca County courthouse debate gets weirder

Amid the back-and-forth debate about whether to preserve the 1884 Seneca County courthouse or raze it comes a request to probe it for ghosts.

The Blade newspaper in Toledo reports [in a story today](#) that "a group that investigates paranormal activity wants to find out if ghosts roam the corridors of Tiffin's historic landmark."

The [Buckeye State Paranormal and Haunting Investigators](#) has asked county commissioners for permission to snoop inside the building.

There have been reports of strange activities in the courthouse, but most have to do with the behavior of a couple of county commissioners who want to tear it down. Still, the commissioners indicated that the group from Bellefontaine could investigate as long as it fills out the necessary paperwork.
